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STAY AWAKE

Wisdom is a central theme in our readings today. It is one of the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit, key to living the stewardship way of life in our complex world. As Christian stewards, we should rely on this gift and ask the Holy Spirit to increase it within us.

Jesus teaches the importance of wisdom in our Gospel passage from Matthew. He tells the parable of ten virgins awaiting the arrival of the bridegroom who will welcome them in to the wedding feast. Five of the virgins were foolish and five were wise. The foolish virgins failed to bring oil along with their lamps when they went to meet the bridegroom. The wise ones, however, had prepared and brought sufficient oil to keep their lamps lit when the bridegroom came. The foolish virgins, caught off guard, ran off to buy more oil, but they were too late. The door to the wedding feast was locked to them. Jesus cautions, "Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

The stewardship way of life - with its daily and weekly commitments to giving God the best of our Time, Talents and Treasure - is the "oil" that we keep with us at all times. When we have this plan in place and we rely deeply on the Holy Spirit to guide us through the twists and turns of each day, we are free, we are ready to answer the Bridegroom when He calls us. We live in wisdom.

ADVENT: A PREPARATION FOR CHRISTMAS

As each year draws to a close, and Christmas fast approaches, we tend to focus on what is obvious – putting up our decorations, trimming our tree, shopping for friends and family. And before you know it, time has escaped us.

Suddenly it's Christmas Eve night and all the wonders that come with it – reflecting on Bethlehem, the birth of Jesus, the angels singing, the shepherds in the field, the wise men beginning their descent from the east, all culminating in “Silent Night, Holy Night.” But wait! Are we even prepared for Christmas? Prepared for all of the beauty and wonder of Christmas? Truly prepared?

Before the coming of our Lord, is the season of Advent. A time of preparation. The world tells us that Christmas is about filling our homes with bright lights and greenery, attending office parties, singing carols, listening to Handel's “Messiah” or the latest pop star's new Christmas album. The world encourages us to shop, shop and shop!

But should we not also be more intentional (and joyful) when practicing and experiencing the season of Advent? The coming of our Lord!

How to Prepare for Christmas, through Advent

And what should we be doing to prepare for the coming of our Lord? The obvious things are:

- Meditate on our Lord's impending birth
- Give to those in need
- Feed the hungry
- Clothe the homeless
- Be kind to others
- Be satisfied with what we have (gratitude)

What ways can we prepare our hearts for the coming of Jesus – in our own homes? How about patience – toward those nearest you? Be more willing to listen, less eager to criticize? Give of your time and your person and not necessarily your money.

We can also practice more patience with those outside of our homes – especially in stores or driving on the road (Christmas shopping traffic!). We can be more giving and patient toward those in the workplace. Maybe we can be less prideful and more humble.

How about being more temperate with our sweet tooth (or teeth, for that matter)? Advent challenges us to understand the Christmas season in the contexts of the coming of Christ. Advent also offers us a powerful alternative to the commercialization of Christmas.

A reason to exclaim “Merry Christmas!” instead of a bland and politically correct “Happy Holidays.”

A Season for Giving

I'm sure you've heard it before; Christmas is a season for giving. Then make it so. Give to those in need. I'm sure you've heard that Christmas is a time for feasting. Then make it so. Help to feed those around you who can't afford to do so. I'm sure you've heard that Christmas is a season of joy, hope and peace. Then make it so. Grow in these virtues by putting them into practice with friends, family, neighbors and strangers. And most importantly, with the whole reason there is Christmas.

Advent is the story of a wondrous moment when God entered our world to make things right. It is the greatest story ever told and it changes everything—including the way we celebrate Christmas. And the next time someone asks you, “Are you ready for Christmas?” you can honestly say, “I'm not but I'm trying to be with the help of the season of Advent.”

Nativity Scene

The church nativity scene is proper for Christmas and not Advent. Once again others have requested that it be displayed. This seems to be an annual request. I've once again readdressed the issue with the individuals. It truly is disappointing since I was expecting a different narrative given the pandemic. We are all struggling to maintain our resilience and hope as we look forward to Advent and the coming Christmas season. Hopefully, our Advent season will prepare us for the coming feasts of Christmas and the display of the nativity scene. I might add to diffuse disappointment - the wise men (or three kings) will be added on the feast of Epiphany on 6th January, as is liturgically proper to the feast.

We must be careful not to speak of “should” and “shouldn't” and “right” and “wrong” because there is no right and wrong. The liturgy has rubrics. The GIRM and other Church documents specify what may and may not be on the altar, said, sung, or otherwise used in the Mass and other liturgies. There is no right and wrong when it comes to nativity scenes. Let's not state our opinions on how we prefer to do things as if they were rubrics of the Church or the personal wishes of others.

I pray for us as a “Faith Community” that we continue our faith journey towards Advent, Christmas and the Kingdom of God. As we journey towards our celebration of the Lord's Birth, let us pray for one another, for all our families, that we be renewed in our commitment to be good stewards of HOPE in this current pandemic. May Mary, who rejoiced at the coming birth of Her Son, pray for us that we may truly be His disciples.
