PASTORAL HOME VISITS

There's now a hold on Home Visits during the Lockdown

Many remain uncomfortable with going to Vigil Mass Saturday and Sunday Mass. Again, we invite you to attend weekday Masses as the numbers attending are very low. If you cannot come and still desire a pastoral visit I'm more than available to bring you Holy Communion, Anointing and Sacramental Confession.

Throughout this pandemic I've also shared the Good News with many of you on the phone. Please call the parish office to setup a home visit or call my cell. Remember, you are not alone. Connection and prayer is only a phone call away.

GENTLE REMINDERS

Masks MUST be worn in Church at ALL times. The only time you take your mask off briefly is at Holy Communion. Some also need to replace their mask after consuming the Eucharist, as you cannot leave the church building holding your mask. Please arrive early. We discontinued locking the doors as others protested. Yet, we have not turned others away. Please do not place your offering before Mass, please give after Mass. With our limit of 30% every space is precious and needs to be accounted for. That will mean some inconvenience on your part. Sitting where you are placed - and move into the pew as to allow others to sit without having close contact with you. Pandemic fatigue has set in for all of us. Please help all of us by being co-operative, charitable and kind. Thank you kindly.

COVID-19 AND PARISH STEWARDSHIP

While the situation of COVID-19 continues to develop in our lives and communities, it is increasingly evident that the pandemic has had, and will continue to have for some time to come, a far reaching impact on all of us. Stewardship/Offertory envelopes are available in numerical order on the table in the crying room. Please enter by the church entrance near the confessional room and exit by the main foyer, exercise social distance and wait until other people have moved on. Please check that your name and address are correct.

If you did not use envelopes last year and wish to begin this year or if you have changed your address, please come to the office during the week. We ask you not to use old Church envelopes from previous years. If you have not used envelopes for a few years your number may have been assigned to someone else. If you would still like your box of envelopes and are not attending please contact the office to arrange a pick up time. We acknowledge also those who have increased in weekly contributions. We do need to do this annually in order to keep up with inflation. Our E-Transfers are also increasing weekly. Thank you!

Once again, and its worth repeating: We thank our COVID-19 homebound faithful parishioners who continue to financially support us while being absent. And recently those who've made an effort to make up on past stewardship in 2020.

CHRISTMAS PASTORAL GREETINGS

“The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness – on them light has shined...for a child has been born for us.” (Isaiah 9:2, 6a)

My dear friends:)

I find it appropriate on this Gaudete (Rejoice the Lord is near) Sunday, to present my Christmas message to all of you with the use of these opening words from the prophet Isaiah, words which open us up to the knowing that darkness will never prevail when we live in the light. And during these unprecedented times in the history of the world where a virus has threatened all of us so deeply to the roots of our being, words of assurance and instances of light are truly welcomed. And it is with this in mind where I sit in my chapel before the Blessed Sacrament - I share with you my message of hope and my blessings to you and your families as this season unfolds.

None of us will ever forget 2020! Covid-19 has dramatically altered everyone's daily life and powerfully exposed the vulnerability that all humans share. This period has forced us to reassess a lot of things. The temptation to return to the past is something that comes naturally to us, but we must always be open to Christ's voice in the present. For Christians, postponing our mission is never a legitimate option; faith cannot be quarantined. It has to be lived in the circumstances of the time.

I was particularly touched by what Pope Francis has written in his new book: Let Us Dream.

“Let us begin anew from the numerous examples of generous, freely-given love, which in these months have shown us how much closeness, care, and sacrifice are needed to nourish fraternity and civil coexistence. In this way, we will emerge from this crisis stronger.”

Christmas for many of us could possibly be very different this year. Family gatherings may not be happening as in days gone by.

The annual pilgrimage to the church on Christmas Eve may or may not take place, depending on what decisions different communities of faith take on in-person worship. Your children or grandchildren may not have the opportunity of sitting on Santa's knee as you travel to the local mall and see the empty chair where the jolly fellow used to sit.

Travel will be different. Christmas pageants may be non-existent. Annual choir concerts will be silent. Things will change and there will be a strangeness to it all, a strangeness which will strike to the very heart of our spirits. But there's something which we always need to keep in mind – the child in Bethlehem will burst into our lives once again. And in these times of darkness, as Leonard Cohen stated, *“There's a crack in everything and that's how the light gets in.” And yes, Jesus is our light and will break through once again.*

Advent is about breaking through and letting in the light, and thanks be to God! If ever there was a season that captured the “mood” of the world in its context, it's Advent 2020. We long for what we believe is yet to come, reflecting upon the hope, peace, joy, and love we know in Jesus Christ, perhaps *especially* because those gifts have seemed to be in shorter-than-usual supply this year. Whether we await divine intervention, or simply the rollout of an effective vaccine, we wait with expectant hope. This is a time to reflect on our needs and the coming of the light that Jesus brings to our world at Christmas.

My hope for all of you is that Christmas will come into your world with a renewed feeling of peace and love and joy and may the Christ-child be born into your hearts once again. My deepest blessings to all of you and may the light of the stable of Bethlehem be found in your life.

Be safe - be in touch ~ be assured that I am holding you in prayer and in our daily celebration of the Eucharist.

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

“Do not be afraid: for see - I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Christ, the Lord” (Luke 2:10)

The Angel of the Lord said these words to the shepherds at the first Christmas. They are just as meaningful today as they were over two thousand years ago. At this moment we are in the midst of a pandemic. We need some ‘good news’.

There is no question that Covid-19 has had a dramatic impact on our world and on our lives. Our Christmas celebrations will be very different this year. Since extended families and friends will not be able to gather, many traditions will need to be altered. This can all be very troubling.

The good news is the Covid-19 cannot stop Christmas! We need not allow our fears and anxiety to rob us of the joy and peace that we celebrate on this feast.

If our temporal activities are significantly restricted this year, perhaps God is giving us an opportunity to contemplate the spiritual meaning of the birth of our Saviour.

In the Gospel of St. John, we are told that *“God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life” (John 3:16)*. This radical love of God is the central theme of Christmas.

We need not worry or be afraid because God will never stop loving and caring for us. Like Our Blessed Mother Mary, all we need to do is trust in that love and be filled with joy.

This year, as we contemplate the Holy Family at Christmas, consider the tranquility that filled the manger scene despite the chaos of the world around them. They were in the presence of Divine Love and this brought them hope and peace.

So be not afraid and trust in God's love for you. This is indeed the ‘good news’ that we need at this time!

May you have a blessed Christmas and a grace-filled New Year.
