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
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NO TIME TO WASTE

Today we begin the beautiful and holy season of Advent. With all that we have going on this time of year, it's no wonder Advent that does not always seem to get the attention it deserves. But if we will commit to living this season well, we will experience a deeper conversion to Christ and find real transformation in our lives as Christian stewards.

Why? Advent calls us not only to look back in grateful contemplation of Christ's first coming, but it also calls us to look forward in preparation for His Second Coming. 

REGRISTRATION FOR CHRISTMAS MASSES

Next Sunday is the Solemnity of Christ the King, and the conclusion of our liturgical year A. Advent is on the horizon - and our new liturgical year B. Advent calls us to be alert, ready. We begin early plans and preparation as we invite you to register for the Christmas Masses. Christmas is a time where a lot of our families and friends join us to celebrate the birth of Christ. That is a joyful and happiest occasion for each of us to get together to worship the gift of Love that God shares with us. Given the situation of COVID-19, we need to limit the numbers and we need to plan for the masses. We want to try to give as many chances for the people and your registration will greatly help in our planning.

Even though it is a pandemic, let us not forget that we need God in our lives and only God can lead us and guide us and give us the strength to face any situations. The church will be disinfected after every Mass. Strict protocols are in place to assure your safety.

The pandemic has caused financial difficulty for a lot of families, young people at colleges or universities, some struggling with terminal illness, seniors and municipal and provincial businesses. The church is not an exception. I invite all those who can do a little more to support our parish. Currently, less than half of our members have supported us throughout the pandemic. Let's act together for a just recovery that includes all. Thank you for your generosity and solidarity.

There will not be an official collection to avoid the interaction between people but we invite you to leave your offering in the basket at the foyer. I hope you will show your generosity as we celebrate the love of God being shared with you and your family.

You can either call or email the parish office indicating your choice of Mass. Please include your full name and phone number and the number of those attending in your household. Registration will close for a Mass if and when maximum capacity is reached. We regret that we will not be able to accommodate anyone coming to Christmas Mass without a reservation.

Please remember that the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass remains in place and people who are at high-risk for severe illness from Covid-19 are encouraged to stay safer at home and participate in Mass remotely. We will be live streaming ALL of our Christmas Masses on Facebook.

Please note: There is no certainty that we will have public Masses at Christmas. For the time being we ask you to continue to register for Christmas Masses. We will continue to monitor the situation and consult with public health officials and our diocesan office to determine the course of action for the weekends ahead.

This has been a difficult year for sure ... there is no debating that. We've all had to make adjustments in our lives, many of which began with real pain but led to positive changes. Remember: We're in this together. God be with you, and within you.

ADVENT: A PREPARATION FOR CHRISTMAS

As each year draws to a close, and Christmas fast approaches, we tend to focus on what is obvious – putting up our decorations, trimming our tree, shopping for friends and family. And before you know it, time has escaped us.

Suddenly it's Christmas Eve night and all the wonders that come with it – reflecting on Bethlehem, the birth of Jesus, the angels singing, the shepherds in the field, the wise men beginning their decent from the east, all culminating in "Silent Night, Holy Night." But wait! Are we even prepared for Christmas? Prepared for all of the beauty and wonder of Christmas? Truly prepared?

Before the coming of our Lord, is the season of Advent. A time of preparation. The world tells us that Christmas is about filling our homes with bright lights and greenery, attending office parties, singing carols, listening to Handel's "Messiah" or the latest pop star's new Christmas album. The world encourages us to shop, shop and shop!

But should we not also be more intentional (and joyful) when practicing and experiencing the season of Advent? The coming of our Lord!

How to Prepare for Christmas, through Advent

And what should we be doing to prepare for the coming of our Lord? The obvious things are:

- Meditate on our Lord's impending birth
- Give to those in need
- Feed the hungry
- Clothe the homeless
- Be kind to others
- Be satisfied with what we have (gratitude)

What ways can we prepare our hearts for the coming of Jesus – in our own homes? How about patience – toward those nearest you? Be more willing to listen, less eager to criticize? Give of your time and your person and not necessarily your money.

We can also practice more patience with those outside of our homes – especially in stores or driving on the road (Christmas shopping traffic!). We can be more giving and patient toward those in the workplace. Maybe we can be less prideful and more humble.

How about being more temperate with our sweet tooth (or teeth, for that matter)? Advent challenges us to understand the Christmas season in the contexts of the coming of Christ. Advent also offers us a powerful alternative to the commercialization of Christmas.

A reason to exclaim "Merry Christmas!" instead of a bland and politically correct "Happy Holidays."

A Season for Giving

I'm sure you've heard it before; Christmas is a season for giving. Then make it so. Give to those in need. I'm sure you've heard that Christmas is a time for feasting. Then make it so. Help to feed those around you who can't afford to do so. I'm sure you've heard that Christmas is a season of joy, hope and peace. Then make it so. Grow in these virtues by putting them into practice with friends, family, neighbors and strangers. And most importantly, with the whole reason there is Christmas.

Advent is the story of a wondrous moment when God entered our world to make things right. It is the greatest story ever told and it changes everything—including the way we celebrate Christmas. And the next time someone asks you, "Are you ready for Christmas?" you can honestly say, "I'm not but I'm trying to be with the help of the season of Advent."

Nativity Scene

The church nativity scene is proper for Christmas and not Advent. Once again others have requested that it be displayed. This seems to be an annual request. I've once again readdressed the issue with the individuals. It truly is disappointing since I was expecting a different narrative given the pandemic. We are all struggling to maintain our resilience and hope as we look forward to Advent and the coming Christmas season. Hopefully, our Advent season will prepare us for the coming feasts of Christmas and the display of the nativity scene. I might add to diffuse disappointment - the wise men (or three kings) will be added on the feast of Epiphany on 6th January, as is liturgically proper to the feast.

We must be careful not to speak of "should" and "shouldn't" and "right" and "wrong" because there is no right and wrong. The liturgy has rubrics. The GIRM and other Church documents specify what may and may not be on the altar, said, sung, or otherwise used in the Mass and other liturgies. There is no right and wrong when it comes to nativity scenes. Let's not state our opinions on how we prefer to do things as if they were rubrics of the Church or the personal wishes of others.

I pray for us as a "Faith Community" that we continue our faith journey towards Advent, Christmas and the Kingdom of God. As we journey towards our celebration of the Lord's Birth, let us pray for one another, for all our families, that we be renewed in our commitment to be good stewards of HOPE in this current pandemic. May Mary, who rejoiced at the coming birth of Her Son, pray for us that we may truly be His disciples.
